On behalf of the Pediatric Oncology Support Team (POST), we are incredibly grateful to the Wycliffe Charities Foundation Board of Governors for supporting our Giving Hope and Family Support Program.

Within the year, your support contributed to allow us to provide 125 families (275 individuals) with psychosocial services that include individual and family therapy, medical play and procedural support, survivorship support, and case management services. The combination of these resources encouraged patients and families to successfully navigate through their cancer experience. Outcomes of this program are as follows:

- 90% of patients reported improved coping and decreased distress.
- 95% of patients will demonstrate medical compliance. This was determined from their medical team that was based off of clinical outcomes and relevant labs.
- 100% of patients and their families felt supported by knowing they have additional resources and people who will advocate for them.

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Mike and Lori had a positive outlook on life. Mark was a plumber providing for his family and Lori was expecting their 3rd child. When 2-year-old Max was having trouble walking, they took him to the ER. They were devastated when the doctor reported Max had an aggressive brain tumor and needed surgery.


After surgery, Max was hospitalized for nearly 4 months because the chemotherapy wreaked havoc, necessitating blood transfusions, a feeding tube, etc. Mike had to quit his job to be at Max's bedside.

"I was pregnant and reached the breaking point. We had absolutely no money coming," Lori said, "so we moved in with Mike's parents. And then a social worker told us about POST".

POST's licensed counselor sustained Mike and Lori through their son's battle and POST's Financial Assistance Program abetted their expenses. Most of all, POST connected them with other families fighting cancer.

"Because POST was there for us 24/7, I had a place where I could cry and just be around people who got me."

After 19 grueling months, Max's tests came back cancer free. "You would never know he was fighting for his life a year ago," said Lori. "We all were fighting for his life."
